Dean Hayden Assumes Post In Graduate Education Program

After five years of service at Trenton State College, Dean Velma D. Hayden is leaving for a position as professor of education at the University of South Carolina. Dean Hayden will be teaching two graduate courses in counselling training and assisting the Dean in the development of the graduate program.

Dean Hayden received her B.A. from the University of Southern California in English; her M.A. from the University of Southern California also in English; her Ph.D. from the University of Connecticut in Guidance and Personnel Administration.

Professional Career

Starting her professional career as a teacher in English in Brimfield, Massachusetts, Dean Hayden has since served as both a member of the faculty and of the administration in various colleges and universities. In 1952-55, she was associate professor and Chairman of the Department of Guidance and Personnel Administration at New York University. In 1956-57, Dean Hayden served as professor of Education, University of South Carolina.

With all of her busy work schedule, Dean Hayden still had time to write numerous articles which were published in periodicals dealing with guidance and public schools. She has also co-authored

two books: *School Guidance and Personnel Services* with F. C. Rosecrance and *Teaching and Learning in the Elementary School* with Dr. Dorothy Petersen of Trenton State.


Newly Elected Signal Staff Headed By Senior Walt May

College students should take advantage of every opportunity that is theirs.

The Scottish songs which I've enjoyed immensely will remain in my memory always.
